What is Eucharistic Adoration?

Our world today offers never ending opportunities to keep us occupied and distracted. Eucharistic Adoration provides Catholic's the exact opposite, a means to step away from the noise. It is a time to enter into a quiet and sacred space to deepen our relationship with Jesus.

There are two types of Eucharistic Adoration, the first type is often scheduled for one hour on a weekly basis in parishes. The second type, Perpetual Adoration, differs in that as the name implies, it is continual and takes place throughout all twenty-four hours of each day. This type of Adoration most often is part of the practices of Religious Orders and even some parishes. During Eucharistic Adoration, the priest takes a consecrated host from the Tabernacle, and places it in a Monstrance. The word "Monstrance" means to show. The Monstrance is then placed on the Altar. This allows everyone in the church to see Jesus who is present and waiting for each of us in the Consecrated Host, the Blessed Sacrament.

What do you do during Eucharistic Adoration? Bishop Fulton Sheen encouraged people to bring their Bibles and practice *Lectio Divina*, which means divine reading. This is when you read a paragraph, or perhaps even a chapter from the Bible and reflect on it. In the book, *Pocket Guide to Adoration*, Father Josh Johnson discusses the five steps of divine reading:

1. **Read:** What does the Scripture Text say in and of itself?
2. **Meditate:** What does the Scripture say to me?
3. **Pray:** Converse with the Holy Spirit of Jesus Christ about what the Scriptures are saying to me.
4. **Contemplate:** Allow myself to be in the stillness of the gaze of Christ as I look at him.
5. **Resolve:** What concrete action will I take in my daily life in response to *Lectio Divina*?



However, what manner each individual chooses to spend time with Jesus during Eucharistic Adoration is up to them as long as it is done in a quiet and reverent manner. Bring a religious book and use the time to read and reflect. Pray the Rosary or other special devotional prayers. Use this time to converse with Jesus privately and engage in active listening before the Consecrated Host. Spend the time in quiet Adoration. It is not a requirement to stay the entire hour, stop in and stay as long as your schedule allows. You do need to be aware that the priest, and parishioners who are present, will say a set of prayers at the beginning, and at the end of Adoration. These prayers are located on the back, inside cover of our missalette.

Many saints have attested to the strength and guidance they received when engaging in Eucharistic Adoration. Two contemporary Saints, Saint Mother Theresa and Saint John Paul II, stated they went to Adoration daily and always said it was how they were able to persevere in God's work. If you are looking for a way to strengthen and deepen your faith, attend Eucharistic Adoration.

You have two opportunities to attend Adoration at St. Luke's: immediately after each Tuesday morning mass, and the first Thursday of every month from 7:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m.. Please come and join us for Eucharistic Adoration and visit our **Lending Library** to learn more.

In the Spirit

This month, we will highlight another Spiritual Gift and that is the charism of *Intercessory Prayer*.

Intercessory prayer, is typically given to those who have a strong sense of compassion and empathy for others. We all have the ability to pray for others, but the gift of intercession is the ability to pray God's perfect will for a person or situation. You do not need a charism of *Intercessory Prayer* to pray for someone else. Prayer for others is one of the spiritual works of mercy and does not require a special gift.

In addition to this kind of intercession for individuals, we are called to intercede intensely for the renewal of our parish, the diocese, and for the larger community. Such prayer is crucial because it changes the spiritual atmosphere of a place or community.

Opportunities for Expressions of Intercessory Prayer in our Parish:

- **Rosary/Novena/Chaplet**
 - ✠ Come a half hour early to weekday Mass to say the Rosary with us.
 - ✠ Attend the St. Luke Marian Divine Mercy from Monday through Friday at 3:00 p.m. in the church and say the Novena Chaplet of the Divine Mercy with us.
- **Eucharistic Adoration**
 - ✠ Attend Adoration after Tuesday morning mass or pray the Divine Mercy Chaplet for the sick and dying of the parish with us on the first Thursday of every month from 7:00-8:00 p.m.



Did you know...

A little-known detail in Catholic Churches is the presence of saint relics inside the primary Altar reserved for the sacrifice of the Mass. These relics are generally encased inside an Altar Stone, though sometimes they can be visibly displayed in special reliquaries.

It is an ancient custom that the Church retains, as specified by the [General Instruction of the Roman Missal](#), "The practice of the deposition of relics of Saints, even those not Martyrs, under the Altar to be dedicated is fittingly retained."

It was common for the early Christians to celebrate memorial Masses in the catacombs, on top of the tombs of the saints. This practice was continued, when churches were built, by transferring relics of the saints to the Altar.

The practice of placing relics underneath the Altar is entirely biblical (see Revelation 6:9). It is not meant to take anything away from our focus on Jesus Christ and his sacrifice on Calvary, but to remind us of how we are to imitate his example.
